The State Digital Equity Planning (SDEP) process will consist of five components:

- Statewide Planning Group (SPG)
- Outcome Area Working Groups
- California Digital Equity Survey(s)
- Regional Local Outreach Events
- Statewide Public Engagement



SDEP APPROACH

Working Group Objectives

- 1. **Develop** a statewide stakeholder map committed to tribal digital equity
- 2. Conduct an asset inventory of programs, plans, and services that are supporting tribal digital equity
- **3. Promote** and encourage tribal residents participation in the Digital Equity Public Survey
- 4. Conduct gap analysis
- **5. Develop** recommendations to CDT on how to align SDEP in consideration of tribal needs in alignment with tribal digital equity plans

February OAWG Meeting: What we learned

During the February Outcome Area Working Group meeting, stakeholders provided input to CDT on barriers to digital equity:

Takeaways from discussion:

- Access and infrastructure (supporting infrastructure (e.g. roads))
- 2. Broadband access should be clearly linked to the outcomes it enables, such as education, health, economic and workforce development
- 3. Affordability and device access
- 4. Digital literacy includes overcoming fear
- 5. Trust and persistent poverty remain barriers to digital equity
- 6. Capacity




How to Take Action

Digital Equity Public Survey

CDT will distribute a statewide **Digital Equity Public Survey in multiple languages** to residents of California to identify barriers to digital equity, especially for Covered Populations.

The survey is intended to capture information about internet access, internet affordability, and internet adoption for residents in California households.

Timeline: Launch Q1 2023



How to Take Action

NTIA - Request for Comment

The Department of Commerce's National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) is **seeking input** on how to structure nearly \$2.7 billion in grant programs to ensure everyone in America has the digital skills and devices they need to realize the full potential of high-speed Internet access.

NTIA requests feedback on the design, rules, and evaluation criteria for both digital equity programs.

- The **State Digital Equity Capacity Grant program** will fund implementation of state and territories' digital equity plans, which will identify barriers in communities to achieving full participation in the digital economy, and strategies to overcome those barriers.
- The Competitive Digital Equity Program will fund organizations including schools, libraries, nonprofits and others offering digital inclusion activities and promoting Internet adoption. NTIA will establish the Competitive Digital Equity Program after it begins awarding funds from the State Capacity Grant Program.
